VERBS

PERSON: 1st, 2nd or 3rd

NUMBER: Singular or Plural

| Person | Number | ending |
|-----------------|----------|--------|
| 1 st | singular | -o |
| 2 nd | singular | -s |
| 3 rd | singular | -t |
| 1 st | plural | -mus |
| 2 nd | plural | -tis |
| 3 rd | plural | -nt |

NOUNS

CASE: What job is the noun doing in the sentence.

Nominative – subject / person DOING the action

Vocative – person spoken to

Accusative – object / person having the action DONE to them

Genitive – of...

Dative – to... for...

Ablative – by... with... from...

NUMBER: Singular or Plural

Is it 1 person or thing OR many people or things.

DO NOT JUST GUESS, GO THROUGH YOU PUELLA, SERVUS ***OR
BELLUM TABLE IN YOUR HEAD***

VOCAB = LEARN IT!

THE REST

Adjectives: Always come after the noun they are describing (except for 'multus-many' which comes before.)

The adjective will always agree with the noun it is describing in 3 ways:

GENDER: masculine, feminine, neuter

CASE: nominative, vocative etc

NUMBER: singular or plural

Eg. Servus bonus - the good slave

Puella bona - the good girl

Vinum bonum - the good wine

Pueros malos vidi - I saw evil boys.

REMEMBER: Acrisius perterritus

= The frightened Acrisius

NOT Acrisius was frightened and.....

Open Questions: -ne on the end of the first word of the sentence makes it question.

Eg. Puellamne amas? = Do you like the girl?

Prepositions:

These are little words that go before a noun. They make the following noun go into either the Accusative or Ablative case.

Eg. In aquam = into the water Acc case

Ab aqua = away from the water Abl case

Pronouns: ego=I tu=you nos=we vos=you(plural)

Imperatives: These are orders or instructions and will end with:

| Conj | Singular | Plural |
|-----------------|----------|--------|
| 1 st | -a | -ate |
| 2 nd | -e | -ete |
| 3 rd | -e | -ite |
| 4 th | -i | -ite |

Eg. Currite, pueri! = Run, boys!

Infinitives: always end "-re" and mean "to...."

Eg, Romanos necare cupivit. = He wanted to kill the Romans.
